Why Learning Communities?

- High Impact Practice (Kuh et al.)
- Key outcomes for LC participants from the NSLLP (Inkelas et al., 2007)
 - Positive interactions with peers and faculty
 - Use of residence hall resources
 - Perceptions of an academically and socially supportive residence hall climate
 - Positive peer diversity interactions
 - More likely than their counterparts in traditional residence halls to experience an easy academic and social transition to college
 - More likely to indicate higher scores in their critical thinking abilities and application of knowledge abilities

Learning Communities at OSU

A Learning Community is a group of students who live together on a residence hall floor with common major, career and/or personal interests. We intentionally form LCs around a range of topics, including:

- Academic Majors
- Interest Areas
- Needs Based upon Year in College

LCs by the Numbers


Residence Life currently offers 17 different programs.

LCs range in size from 20 to 100 students.

In 2014-2015, about 13% of all OSU first-year students are affiliated with one of our LCs.

We currently have LCs housed in 13 different residence halls on campus.
